"I Feel You Staring" is so important to me because I wanted to showcase what that feeling of being looked at feels like visually; a feeling of repression, of being stripped away of control and freedom through Maya's story. Maya's story in a way is my story, your friends, sisters, aunts or your mothers story, and that's why it had to be told. I know I can't control how you look at me, your eyes are out of my reach. I can though make a film and try to make you look at this repressing feeling. How we all are contributors to the way we look at each other. My vision was to make this film to showcase the reality of so many women, who are Maya and for all the people of any gender, who experience to be looked at and not to sugar coat it. I wanted to make people look at this issue directly and I wanted to look back at you with this film.



SWAEN LIEVESTRO WRITER

Swaen is a writer and cinematographer whose aim is to tell stories in the most visual way: conveying moods and emotions with strong imagery is her approach to storytelling. I Feel You Staring is a highly intimate story, as she transcribed personal feelings to a surreal, horror-like script. The invasive feeling of "Being looked at" is a complex thing for all women. Often it can feel like a threat: objectifying, sexualising, and intimidating. Swaen was looking for a way to visualise this invasiveness, which lead her to create a character who can feel a stare on her skin like touch - that then lead her to write the uncomfortably intimate close ups of unwelcome hands on a woman's skin. I Feel You Staring is her transcript of the harmful repercussions of the male gaze.

This is also a feeling that I have felt in various situations and I am able to approach the subject matter from the perspective of a man who experiences a different kind of stare, yet feeling similar discomfort. I hope that this film can provide the audience with similar educational benefits that it has afforded him so that greater light and exposure can be brought to such a present issue."
